• BERLIN INHABITANTS DO NOT WANT RUSSIAN CONTROL.

• <u>5 JUNE 1946</u>:

UNITED KINGDOM, UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, FRANCE AND RUSSIA SIGN THE 'ALLIED CONTROL COUNCIL' AGREEMENT.

THIS WAS TO OVERSEE THE POLITICAL AND DIPLOMATIC ISSUES FOR THE RESTORATION OF GERMANY.

THE UNION OF SOUTH AFRICA AGREE TO ESTABLISH A MILITARY MISSION IN BERLIN.

ASSIST SOUTH AFRICAN CITIZENS IN GERMANY.

ASSIST POTENTIAL IMMIGRANTS TO SOUTH AFRICA.




