The disk requires Adobe Reader, which can be obtained free at www.adobe.com.

This Award Winning exhibit of Early Cape Postal History by Dr. Robert Taylor, has been transferred to C/D by scanning into Omnipage Pro 12, an Optical Character Recognition Program, and then saved as Adobe Acrobat 5 'pdf' files, 1 frame/file.

The point of going through the OCR step was twofold. First, to bring the file size down to a manageable size, some 12 MB instead of 900 MB, and also to enable searching with Acrobat's search feature.

It does, however, have some drawbacks. The OCR operation introduces some typographical errors of its own, and some of these have crept through. It also does not completely accurately reproduce type style and formatting. Thus the text appears slightly different, and has some errors. Hopefully not misleading. These errors are the fault of the Compiler.

Some text was difficult to recognize for the OCR program, and these areas have been retained as (unsearchable) images.

The original exhibit was on cream paper, and this background color has been lost in the areas that were not retained as images.

ALL of the philatelic material has been retained as direct scanned images to avoid distortion. On these images, the cream paper color can be seen.

The base CD is of special archival quality, but careful storage is suggested.

The Table of Contents was produced by the Compiler, who takes responsibility for it.



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#### Early Postal Services at the Cape of Good Hope 1653 - 1853



18th. Century Map Cape of Good Hope

#### Background

This exhibit shows the rates, routes and markings used to develop a postal system for the Colony of the Cape of Good Hope between 1653 and 1853. Commissioned by the Dutch East India Company, Jan van Riebeck founded the colony in 1652 to service ships of the Company's fleet at midpoint between Holland and the East Indies. Under Dutch control by the Dutch East India Company for 140 years, no official postal service existed until the opening of the post office at Cape Town in 1792. Company correspondence was carried to and from Cape Town by ships' masters on Company ships. Private overseas correspondence entered and left the colony by private arrangement, including remuneration, between the sender and the ship's master or crew or a passenger. Inland transmission of mail was also by private arrangement and often carried by a native runner.

In 1791, a delivery charge of 1 skilling per sheet was established for overseas mail an in 1792, the rate was indicated by the VOC handstamp of the Company, the first postal marking. No official rate for inland mail existed.

In 1795, the British took the Colony from the Dutch but services remained unchanged and handstamps were abandoned. Field Comets, appointed by the Governor on the recommendation of local magistrates or Landdrosts as subordinate magistrates, began to carry the post in 1798.


The Treaty of Amiens returned the Cape to the Dutch in 1803 and the first postal routes were opened, one between Cape Town and Algoa Bay and one between Simonstown and Cape Town. These routes were also available to the colonists for overseas mail and marked the beginning of an organized postal service. No handstamps were used and the overseas rates remained unchanged.

In 1806, the British again took the Cape from the Dutch and expanded postal routes and established inland and overseas rates. The use of handstamps was reintroduced and expanded and by 1853 when adhesive stamps were introduced, a well functioning postal service was in place.

#### Exhibit Plan.

In so far as possible, the presentation is chronological through the four administrations. Some aspects such as the Field Comets and Forwarding Agents cover the entire period and are treated separately. Items of particular interest or significance are framed.

In 1652, Jan van Riebeeck was commissioned by the Dutch East India Company to establish a colony at the Cape of Good Hope to provision its fleet at the half way point between Holland and the East Indies. For the next 140 years, no official postal service existed save for Company correspondence carried by Masters of the Company's ships.



Dutch immigrants or "Free Burghers" established farms to provide foodstuffs for the Company ships but had to make their own arrangements for the transmission of correspondence. On overseas correspondence coming into the colony, the sender made arrangements with the ship's master, a crew member or passenger for delivery to the Cape Colony and, if local, to the addressee for a previously agreed fee. Delivery inland was usually by native runners.



Casper Villers, an early free burgher, established a farm called "Zorgveliet"

To increase chance of delivery, name of ship and its Captain together with talismanic inscription placed in lower left corner.



Letter addressed "To the Ship's Carpenter, Jan Hendrick Mattheis at the Ship's carpenter yard - Cape.

Four loops indicate a four sheet letter.

Date of correspondence often entered in pencil on wrapper when contents removed.

The Dutch East India Company, governed by a board of seventeen directors, was solely responsible for the administration of the Cape Colony. The chief executive, known as Commander until 1691 and then as Governor, was appointed by the Directors and much of the official correspondence of this period was directed to the Governors.



Letter posted prior to his appointment in 1771.

Joachim van Plettenberg appointed Acting Governor in 1771 and served as Governor 1774 - 1785.




Two early letters from Holland carried "by Favor" without the customary talismanic inscription.

j Archivists and others removing a letter from its wrapper, commonly noted the date of the letter in pencil on the front or reverse to preserve it, These two examples show the date on the reverse.





 $^{1795}\,$  Unofficial correspondence carried "by favor" hence the absent VOC stamp.

Local letters during this period are very uncommon and those in English more so. The letter has been removed from this wrapper and the date noted in pencil. Delivery by private hand.



Written on the inside of the wrapper: "The gun powder and shot are in your chest".

Briefstok letter.

Inland correspondence carried by native, usually Hottentot, runners. Held aloft in a cleft stick or "briefstok" to protect it from handling or while fording streams.

Remuneration arranged between sender and runner.

On 2 March 1792, Acting Governor Johan Isaac Rhenius signed a proclamation establishing a packet service between Holland, the Cape & East Indies. A post office was opened at Cape Town and service was available to the public for overseas mail. Each piece was required to be stamped, No provision was made for inland delivery.



"VOC" Monogram handstamp of the Dutch East India Company.

Handstamp applied at Company's offices in Holland validating prepayment of 6 stuivers per sheet. Cape postmaster required to collect 8 stuivers per sheet from addressee on delivery.




Seal shows the VOC monogram with a "C" added at the base for "Cabo" and an "S" at the top probably indicating "Secretary".



Undated wrapper showing two seals and addressed to "The Governor or in his place the Second Person in command at the Cape of Good Hope."



Letter dated 17 July 1795 from Admiral Sir George Keith Elphinstone aboard HMS Monarch to Alexander Farquar, Naval Storekeeper at Simonstown. Written by John Jackson, secretary to Elphinstone directing him to take provisions from Monarch's stores to feed Hottentots and slaves arriving in Simonstown during the short campaign which gave control of the Cape Colony to the British on 16 September 1795



Monarch anchored in Simon's Bay. Unrated letter hand delivered by naval personnel as Dutch still in control of Cape.

Cape surrendered to British by Dutch 16 September 1795. Post office reopened 6 March 1798. Letter rate of 1792 remained 6 stuivers or 1 skilling per sheet. No changes in services made and no Cape markings used during this period.



Dispatch date 26 Sept. 97 on reverse.

Rated at London Ship Letter Office: 4d. ship letter rate of 1796 + Id. Shipmaster's gratuity = 5d. Cursive PORTSMOUTH/SHIP LRE transit stamp uncommon.

# First British Occupation

#### Burgher Senate Stamp

Seal crafted from silver and impressed in wax to seal official correspondence. Used as handstamp to validate official status of letters.




Three examples known.

Burgher Senate ofsix colonists created by government during first British occupation, replacing the ineffective Dutch Burgher Councillor committee, to represent concerns of the Burghers or colonists to the government. Abolished in 1828 and replaced by English system of local magistrates and justices of the peace.

Cape Colony returned to Dutch Batavian government by treaty of Amiens in 1803.

No postal markings during this period. Rate remained 6 stuivers or 1 skilling per sheet.

Postal routes - Cape Town - Algoa Bay and Cape Town - Simonstown opened for official and public use.



First Surgeon J.H. Richter attached to Batavian troops at Hout Bay in 1804.

Oval Medallion Post Office Letter Stamp.

First English postal handstamp used at the Cape. Brought from England by armed forces retaking Cape Colony from the Dutch in 1806. Used only at Cape Town on inland mail to indicate prepayment of postage on dispatching or claiming mail or to validate official status of correspondence.



Single sheet rates of 1805 on the 3 existing routes.

- 1 sk. Cape Town Stellenbosch or Simonstown.
- 2 sk. Cape Town Roodezand, Swellendam or Saldanha Bay.
- 4 sk. Cape Town Graff-Reinet, Algoa Bay, Mossel Bay or Plettenberg Bay.

Use as arrival and dispatch stamp between Simonstown and Cape Town.



1807 London - Simonstown - Madeira

Posted at London 11 Feb 1807 to Madeira, normally 5 to 6 weeks. Placed in error in bag of India letters. Found May 4 at Simon's Bay. Delivered in Madeira 10 months later, 13 months after posting absent any London or Cape markings.

Uncommon example of Oval Medallion impression in wax as well as handstamp applied at Cape Town validating official correspondence to Deputy Fiscal at Simonstown.




Oval Medallion Stamp on rated correspondence.



## Official Correspondence

To curb abuses, Postal Directive of 8 February 1817 listed persons and offices entitled to postage free service and mandated manuscript "Free" be inscribed in **red** ink at Cape Town.

Campie, Scotland - Cape Town Posted 5 March 1806 Arrived 5 August 1806

Letter to Major John Graham, 93r <sup>d</sup>. Highlanders, from his mother on hearing of Dutch capitulation. She states "I see by this day's paper the India ships have rec'd their final dispatches so shall send off this letter and write again." As was customary, sender indicated ship Adeona as carrier. Bay Isle substituted as Adeona may have sailed. Not rated at London, probably carried "by favor" by ship's personnel or passenger

Official Postal Stationery.

Printed official letter folders with the name of the government department were introduced in 1807.





#### Ship Letter Stamp of 1807

Ship Letter Stamp placed in use at Cape Town in 1807 to distinguish overseas mail from domestic. Used both as arrival and dispatch stamp. Earliest known use, 20 December 1807. It was used infrequently until at least 1849 during a period when the dated and undated letter stamps were used for the same purpose.



Wrapper encloses letter to Wm. Robertson of Maude & Robertson, Victuallers and Agents to the Royal Navy. Rated <u>6s. at</u> London. London P,M.G. could authorize overseas agents to collect 3s. for every 50 letters handed them by ship masters.

Unrated at Cape Town. Rated 4d. India ship letter rate of 1819 + 8d. Dover - London inland rate 1812 = Is.

Letter from Cape Town to London carried by the Hon. East India Co's extra ship, Carmarthen. Shipping schedule from Cape Times October 1811.





Rated 8d. "in all" ship letter rate of 1840 at London.
Very late usage as attested by worn state of stamp.

In 1780, Gov. J. van Plettenberg erected a beacon on the Zeekoerivier marking the northernmost point in the Colony for establishing farms. Theodorus Potgieter married October 10, 1780 and settled on the Zeekoerivier.





Letter from Major J.C. Cuyler, Acting Landroost at Uitenhage to Theo. Potgieter d'oude, Zeekoerivier, dated October 23, 1813.

Official post office handstamp issued to Cape Town post office by Colonial Office in London and required on all letters carried by packet. Used only at Cape Town, it is the first to incorporate the date in its design.



British Ship Letter Act of 1815 tripled single sheet packet letter rate to 3s.6d. Act repealed in 1819. Ten examples of handstamp recorded.

The Crown in Circle Handstamps.

To establish control over rapidly increasing inland postal use, 18 district post offices were opened between 1816 and 1824. Together with Cape Town, each was issued a brass handstamp manufactured in London by an engraver, R. Scott. Each is different with a distinctive crown within a circle and lettering which varies in size. The first four were issued in 1817 to Cape Town, Stellenbosch, Simonstown and Uitenhage.

Handstamps indicated prepayment of postage or official exemption therefrom. Examples of all are shown with the stamp illustrated.







#### Simonstown

On February 8, 1817, Acting Governor Lord Charles Somerset issued a directive curtailing the number of persons entitled to send and receive colonial letters free of postage. Still listed was HM Fiscal Daniel Denyssen at Cape Town.





#### Somerset West (Hottentots Holland)

First post office at Somerset West opened in 1822. and in Somerset East in 1825. Both offices remain open today. Because of the great variance in distance from Cape Town, the rates from Somerset East were much greater than from Somerset West. The 3d. single sheet rate from Somerset West compared to the 1s.1d rate from Somerset East. It would appear each was issued an identical handstamp.







Early official letters showing only the stamp of the dispatch office. One correctly placed in the upper right corner and one incorrectly placed.

In settlements with no post office, the Landrost served as post master and his home as post office. Governor's directive of 1810 gave Landrosts official free mail.







Impressions of Post Office Letter Stamps impressed in wax cut from sealed letters or wrappers.

Handstamps, worn and frequently clogged with wax, responsible for scarcity of clear impressions. Tooth brushes issued district postmasters to clean them appear to have been rarely used.

Authorized by Robert Crozier, Postmaster General at Cape Town and patterned after Packet Letter Stamp, it established date of posting. In use 1822-1828. During the preadhesive period, only Cape Town and Port Elizabeth were issued dated letter stamps.

#### Agent's Correspondence

Directive of 8 February 1817, by Lord Charles Somerset, deleted Orphan Chamber from list of persons and entities entitled to send and receive letters free of postage.

"Agent" - The term applied to postmasters and "post holders", individuals authorized to act for the postmaster. Both were appointed by the Governor of the Colony on recommendation of the Landdrost or local district manager.





#### India Ship Letters

From its inception, the East India Company carried the bulk of the mail between the Batavian Republic, India, the Cape of Good Hope and England. By 1799, the revenue was considerable and the English Ship Letter Act of 1799 sought to capture some of this for the government postal service. Reluctant to lose this and powerful enough to largely circumvent provisions of the act, the Company obtained a concession in the Ship Letter Act of 1819 which established a 4d. India ship letter rate for letters not exceeding 3oz.




### Field Comets Post

Initiated in 1693 to carry government dispatches to district officials. Field Comets appointed by the Landdrost or chief magistrate of the Drostdy or district. Reorganized by Lt. W.B.B. Pavaracini di Capelli in 1803 to include provision for postal services to the public over inland routes. The Field Comets continued to be an integral part of the postal system throughout the 19th. century.





To halt widespread abuse of free franking privilege, Government Minute of 30 December 1824 ordered all correspondence relating to public business from government departments or individuals be made through the Colonial Secretary who would certify them with his signature or a facsimile. Widely ignored it was abolished by Government notice December 9, 1852.







Letter from J.D. Overstreet, Stamp Office, Cape Town advising Clerk of Peace, Graaf-Reinet of stamps delivered. Signature of sender required by Ordinance of 9 October 1826 and entered, an unusual observance of the rule.

The requirement that all official mail be passed to the office of Secretary to the Government for approval added a time consuming chore alleviated by the use of stamped facsimiles. Rarely was time taken for the official to actually sign the face of the letter. Two wrappers with original signature of J.M. Craig.





Wrapper rated 1 s.unpaid at Grahamstown or Graff-Reinet.

In 1798, the British Post Office admitted the official means of transmitting letters was so "evidently defective as to render the mode of sending them by private vessels and private persons indispensable." Firms or individuals acting as forwarding agents were usually involved with commercial shipping and knew the fastest and cheapest routes. Even though it meant a significant loss of revenue, the Post Office tolerated the practice until steam navigation and the improvement of postal services in the nineteenth century made the agent's services obsolete.

In forwarding mail, forwarding agent usually made arrangements directly with sender, noted the agent's name on the cover and placed it aboard the first vessel available. Direct address to agent unusual.



"Refused for Postage" at Graaf-Reinet and charged Is. triple sheet rate of 1 March 1846 for transit to Graaf-Reinet and another Is. for return to Richmond where sender had to pay 2s. to get his letter back.

Late Letters ca. 1850

At Cape Town and Grahamstown, letters were received up to one hour before dispatch and at district post office up to 45 minutes before dispatch. Once a particular mail had closed, late letters would be stamped as such and could be posted for another 15 minutes upon payment of Is. regardless of weight or destination.



Rated 4d. paid, an additional I s. paid on stamping.

Sometime in 1846, after nineteen years of use, Cape Town post office replaced the POST PAID stamp with the PREPAID. Manufacturer unknown. In use only seven years, it is the least common of these stamps.






Ms. 'R.E.O. (Royal Engineers Office) 2/4/49 by sender. Sealed with seal of Royal Engineers. Local letter probably hand delivered as it shows no evidence of passing through the office of Secretary to Government or the General Post Office.



Cape Naval Station commanded by Rear Admiral Reynolds who was entitled to the free franking privilege. Letter signed by him and sealed with his personal seal. This too appears to have been hand delivered, a practice to be expected in a military organization.

Soldier's Letter 1850

Act of Parliament of 1837 revised rates for soldier's & seamen's letters and included special provisions for those serving in the East Indies, Ceylon, Mauritius, St. Helena and the Cape of Good Hope. Letters sent by them were charged **to the recipient** under the following formula. Id. charged if the letter was posted in the UK. Id. + 2d. sea postage if posted from any of the above areas and 4d. if carried by private ship.




Letter from Pvt. Sullivan to Secretary to the Court of Directors, East India House originally charged 4d. Deleted and 2d. entered. Possibly due to official nature of correspondence, charged only 2d. sea postage.

Over two decades of use made the Post Office Letter Stamps of little or no use and their replacement urgent. 59 stamps with an octagonal frame 23mm. by 23mm. and one, 26mm. by 26mm., and consecutive numbers 1 - 60 were obtained. The 26mm. stamp was issued to Somerset East. Number I was reserved for Cape Town but never placed in use. Of the remaining 59, 9 are not known to have been issued and 6 have no known examples. Of the 44 post offices for which examples are known, 39 are shown here.

# The Octagonal Numeral Stamps

Postmaster's private handstamp.

From 1849 to 1853, the postmaster at Swellendam occasionally used his own small "PREPAID" stamp with the octagonal numeral 30.



Port Elizabeth was never issued an octagonal numeral handstamp but in late December 1852, PAID and TO PAY letter stamps were placed in use making this the only post office other than Cape Town to employ dated letter stamps. In use until 1 September 1853, less than a year, they are uncommon. Some authorities question the existence of genuine examples of the TO PAY stamp.







Handstamp in red is very rare.

#### **Overseas Mail**



Port Elizabeth - Cape Town - London

Posted at Port Elizabeth 18 March 1853. Undated letter stamp Type 3 applied at Cape Town and rated Is. single sheet packet letter rate of 1853. Rated 8d. uniform "in all" ship letter rate of 1840 at London.

# Appendix 1

# Octagonal Numeral Letter Stamps And Other Items

Impressions of "51" Bathurst & "53" Prince Albert in blue ink.

In 1911 the Consul General for the Netherlands in Cape Town, H. Van Oordt von Lauwenrecht, requested impressions be made from dies held in the archives of the Cape Town Post Office. Mr. Twycross, the postmaster. obliged but was woefully ignorant of the post offices assigned the dies.



Issued in 1849, "51" to Bathurst and "53" to Prince Albert.

After the introduction of adhesive stamps in 1853, "51" was given to Port Alfred, about 10 kilometers southeast of Bathurst, to cancel them. The only post office officially authorized to do so.



A crude imitation of genuine stamp. Irregular letters and border, badly drawn crown and intense black ink characteristic of forgery.





Many of the forged handstamps are alleged to have been created by Adrian Jurgens using the dies created to illustrate his book "The Handstruck Letter Stamps of the Cape of Good Hope from 1792 to 1853 and the Postmarks from 1853 to 1910." published in 1938 before modem photocopying techniques could be used to accurately reproduce the stamps resulting in discrepancies which are usually readily discernible. The illustrations from Goldblatt's book "Postmarks of the Cape of Good Hope", published in 1983 are far more accurate reproductions of the <u>originals</u>



The forged stamp on a genuine cover. The major difference in the forgery is the straight right leg of the "R" which is gently curved in the genuine. "A" upright in the forgery but tilted to the left in the genuine..

# **Undated Letter Stamp Forgery**



Forged handstamp identical to Jurgen's illustration on genuine undated wrapper. Chief characteristic of forgery is the tilted crossbar of the orb.

6d. rate shown is incompatible as it was replaced by the 4d. uniform rate one year before the introduction of the Undated Letter Stamp.

Indistinct serifs, lack of the date and poorly formed letters of "Port Elizabeth" mark this a forgery.

Some experts deny the existence of genuine examples of this handstamp.

# Appendix 2

Langley Correspondence

#### Letter to Benjamin Langley from his wife, Anna Catharina 26 April 1823

Benjamin Langley, the first of three brothers to emigrate from England to the Cape, arrived at Cape Town 27 August 1808 and first worked as a clerk in the Naval Office. Three and a half years later, he married Anna Catherina Koster, a widow four years older than he. He continued to work at the Naval Office until 1814. He then dealt extensively in real estate before returning to England leaving the Cape on 14 June 1821 with his wife remaining behind. After two years, she writes her husband detailing her financial woes due, in large part, to swindles engineered by Benjamin's two brothers, Samuel and Joseph. In response to his wife's pleas, Benjamin returned to the Cape on 31 May 1823.

Letter from Joseph and Samuel Langley to their brother Thomas. 30 June 1823

Brothers Joseph and Samuel Langley arrived at Cape Town on 7 December 1814. An unnamed uncle apparently left a sizeable estate to four Langley brothers, Benjamin, Joseph, Samuel and Thomas naming the latter Executor. Here Samuel tells Thomas of Benjamin's arrival from England and says he is on speaking terms with Benjamin but will have nothing further to do with him after serving him for eight years and being little better off than when he left England. Joseph details shipments of wine and ale to Thomas and complains of Benjamin's laxity in handling payments due him from prior shipments. Both brothers apparently have little use for Benjamin.

# Letter from Samuel to Thomas 24 November 1824

Samuel complains to Thomas that Benjamin cheated him out of £100 and then transferred all of his property and slaves to Henry Batt before declaring insolvency. Batt was a wine merchant doing business in the same area of Cape Town as Benjamin. The last paragraph authorizes Thomas to receive the yearly income from Joseph's and Samuel's portion of the estate of the uncle, Robert Langley, Esq. This seems to figure prominently in the bad relationship with Benjamin.

Letter from Samuel to Thomas. 10 January 1827

Samuel tells Thomas, who has been cheated £ 10 by a Thos. Stratford, that said Stratford must answer to him if he ever returns to England. A post script says getting any settlement from Benjamin is out of the question. Certainly, Benjamin and his brothers are still at odds.



#### Letter from Samuel to Thomas 10 April 1829

Some of the mystery clears. Samuel writes that he and Joseph have had a charge of £ 275 made in favor of one "Cutting" in error due to shenanigans on the part of Benjamin. Apparently Thomas controls the proceeds from Robert Langley's estate left to Samuel and Joseph. They send Thomas copies of their financial obligations requesting payment but Benjamin continues to thwart them.

#### Letter from Samuel to Thomas 29 July 1829

Samuel complains that Thomas overcharged the account he maintains for Samuel and Joseph by 575 in settling Cutting's account six years earlier. He says Benjamin called him "deranged" in a letter to Thomas and that Benjamin does not account to him as he has always done to Benjamin. The thorny relationship seems not to improve with time.



#### Letter from Henry Leath to Thomas 29 February 1832

Mr. Leath tells Thomas that Samuel died on 1 February 1832 having been preceded in death by Joseph. The two brothers owed Leath a sum of money and Samuel had paid some of it in installments but 25 remained unpaid. Leath pleads that Thomas make good on the debt as he has a large family and little to sustain them. He says he believes Benjamin will honor the debt and adds a post script saying he has recently seen Benjamin who plans to write soon. The resolution of all this is unknown to me but the deaths of Samuel and Joseph end this saga.
